From the Pastor

If worship is important to you, then you may feel like I did when we were finally able to be together in worship on February 14 (Valentine's Day, coincidentally). I felt so glad to be able to come into this place of worship to sing, pray, meditate, and be in fellowship. There is something really missing in my life when I am not here with you to nourish and nurture my own spiritual life and relationship. Many of you were so very thoughtful to remember to keep us afloat with the funds for our mission and ministry which do not stop because of weather! Thank you.

This is going to be a bit jumpy, because a lot of thoughts are flashing in and out of my head! First, Lent has begun. It is a countdown of 40 days to Easter (not counting Sundays, because they are considered little Easters). What do I sacrifice for the Lord during this important time? It must be more than a casual easy thing to give up.

I was invited to a Richmond Faith Leader's Breakfast yesterday at the James Center, on the 21st floor! What a view! This was a time to look at one of the ugliest sights in the world – HIV/Aids. The Balm of Gilead is a powerfully articulate ministry to help us become aware of the threat and to reflect on our response and responsibility to minister to the least of those among us. It was not a hard sell for me, since I have lost two people in my life from this dreaded illness. The truth is that AIDS is on the rise. Every 9 ½ minutes an American is becoming infected with HIV/AIDS.

March 7-13 is the "National Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS. Let's learn about this horrible disease and what we can and should do to help.

I was at a rally at the Capitol Tower. My heart is broken for children whose future is now being impacted in a way that I had never dreamed. We are the 8th wealthiest state in the US; but we are the 49th in some areas of need for children. The prophet Amos used plumb line to hang out over the wall to demonstrate that the people of God were not straight, out of kilter with God's will. This is an apt measure for our time.

At this rally I heard a young lady, Tammy Rostov, who is a 2nd generation small business person of a delightful coffee and tea shop known as Rostov's Coffee & Tea. She gave a testimony to the crowd about her view of her small group of employees as *family*. (an admirable concept that few business people have) She provided health insurance and sacrificed her profit margin. When the premiums went out the roof, she raised the deductible to \$5,000. Then, she had a small outpatient procedure and her premium went up over 40%. The small profit she made went poof! I went right over to her shop and thanked her by buying her products. Turns out she has worked closely with some other churches! By the way, the coffee and tea is out of this world.

I am excited about a book that is near completion on our Jubilee Assistance Fund that provides a collateral source through the Virginia United Methodist Credit Union to those who are desperate and are highly tempted to turn to the legal loan sharks, known as Pay Day/Car Title Lenders.

New windows in the Education wing, strong efforts to get the sound system for the Social Hall and improvements for the sanctuary system are in progress. Still ahead are the plans for the Gills House, the entrance, the church building and stained glass, and more lighting to protect people and property.

Then in the midst of this, we are pooling our resources to assist Santo Joseph and his family in Haiti, making health kits and raising funds to buy a special "Relief" tent and travel to Santo's home. Ideas are percolating about our mission for his family in Haiti and for his father who may return with him.

Life is never simple. Many things are going on and there is much to consider. We are challenged; but God is our strength and our shield.

Random Thoughts

St. Patrick's Day, March 17

The person who was to become St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, was born in Wales about AD 385. His given name was Macwyn. Far from being a saint, until he was 16, he considered himself a pagan. At that age he was sold into slavery by a group of Irish marauders who raided his village. It was during that captivity that he became closer to God.

He escaped from slavery after six years and went to Gaul where he studied in the monastery under St. Germain, Bishop of Auxere for a period of twelve years. During these years he became aware that God was calling him to bring Christianity to Ireland. He eventually became the Bishop of Ireland and was highly successful in bringing converts to Christ. This fact upset the pagan Druids who had him arrested several times, although he escaped each time.

St. Patrick travelled throughout Ireland establishing monasteries, schools and churches. His highly successful mission lasted for thirty years. He died on March 17, in AD 461.

A great deal of folklore surrounds St. Patrick's Day. Not much of it is actually substantiated. Some of the folklore includes the belief that he raised people from the dead. Perhaps most prominent is the belief that he drove all of the snakes out of Ireland. Of course, no snakes were ever native to Ireland, and some believe that this is a metaphor for the conversion of pagans. Although St. Patrick's Day was originally a Catholic holy day, it has evolved into more of a secular holiday.

One particular icon of the day is the shamrock. This stems from a more bona fide Irish tale that tells how St. Patrick used the shamrock to explain the Trinity. He used it to show that the Father, Son and Holy Spirit could all exist as separate elements of the same entity.

The St. Patrick's day custom came to America in 1737. That was the first year St. Patrick's day was publicly celebrated in this country, in Boston.

St. Patrick is a hero of the Christian faith and mission in the world, but it is Christ himself who is the ultimate hero!

February Council Notes

The Council met on Tuesday, February 16, 2010. After a devotion by Kip Robinson, Sue Swadley gave a report on our ministries to Children. In addition to Sunday School at 9:30, we provide a Children's Church for age 4 through 1st grade and Junior Church for grades 2 through 5 during the time of the 10:50 AM Church service. Vacation Bible School is scheduled for June 27 – July 1 and the annual Arts Camp is set for the last two weeks in July. Bill Giese reported on the replacement of gutters and downspouts. Bill also reported that the cost of installing two doors into the Unity Room, providing a cement walkway outside, bricking up the present entrance, and removing part of the wall between the Unity room and hallway would be between \$47,000 and \$52,000. Council decided to put this on hold until the cost of several other projects is better defined. He called attention to the new windows in the Education building and stated that we are working on additional lights for security. Finance Chair Butch Kelchner reported that if we had paid all of our conference apportionments for January, our deficit would be approximately \$5,000. His report is included in the newsletter. Finance recommended: 1. that we omit audits for 2007 and 2008 and proceed with an audit of 2009; 2. Approval of an expense of \$685 for downspouts; and 3. make an adjustment to the budget of \$221.58. These adjustments were approved. Rev. Charles reported that we have raised \$1,030 for the Santo Haiti fund and \$2,525 for the Umcor Haiti relief. Charles is in the process of planning a trip to the Holy Land for February or March 2011. He reported on sound and video system improvements. After refinement of the list, it will be submitted to the Trustees for their approval and later to Memorials committee for possible funding.

What is the Shepherd's Center? The Shepherd's Center is an interfaith, non-profit service organization comprised of volunteers who realize that through giving of themselves they receive a profound sense of purpose and meaning in their own lives. It's seniors helping seniors.

The concept of The Shepherd's Center originated in Kansas City, Missouri, in 1972. It has spread to more than 60 locations throughout the United States. The Shepherd's Center of Richmond was begun in 1984. The work is made possible by volunteers who give their time, talent, and experience.

Contributions from individuals, foundations, congregations and corporations help make this possible.

Gifts to The Shepherd's Center are tax deductible.

The Shepherd's Center offers a variety of classes, and lectures are offered at multiple sites in Richmond for eight weeks. They also offer opportunities for travel. It offers services to any member of the community 60 years of age or older. There are no fees; however, contributions to the Center are appreciated.

Transportation: rides to medical and dental appointments and grocery stores are available between 9:00 AM and 3:30 PM Monday through Friday. Must call two weeks ahead of your first appointment to learn about the services offered by the Center.

Grocery Shopping: is done a maximum of twice a month for persons unable to shop for themselves or those needing assistance.

Friendly Calls / Visits: an individual wanting additional companionship and support is assigned a volunteer. Weekly contact is made usually by telephone.

Minor Home Repairs: services include minor plumbing, electrical and carpentry repair. Clients pay for the cost of materials.

Useful Bits: volunteers will write letters, read aloud, balance check books and write checks.

How do you receive services? If you are 60 years of age or older, you may call the Center's office at 355-7282.

Jubilee Assistance Fund

If you are having a rough time financially, you are not alone. But this is a time to unite and to be supportive in relieving the burden of debt. This is Jubilee, an ancient concept of faith to help those who are most vulnerable. The Jubilee Assistance Fund (JAF) is a way we can help.

This is how it works. Instead of going to a legal loan shark who will give you \$500 at a ridiculous immoral rate (The church calls this the evil of usury.), become a member of the Virginia United Methodist Credit Union (\$5 to open a share account). Apply immediately for a loan. If you are denied because of a number of reasons, not least of which is poor credit, come back to the church and ask for an application for assistance through JAF. We will ask for some agreements that include counseling and education, and providing payroll or bank deduction. Then the credit union will consider a loan by

using funds from our JAF share account to collateralize the loan dollar for dollar. This will give you the lowest interest rate possible.

In tough times, we need to help each other. We need to be bold and creative, which is our heritage from John Wesley. He was ever ready to help the poor and the oppressed. This is our call to live out love in concrete ways rather than turning our heads from our brothers and sisters.

Youth Ministry News

The youth group had some time off due to the wintry weather, but we still came back to take 13 youth and 4 adults to Eagle Eyrie Retreat Center in Lynchburg, VA for the Ashland District Winter Youth Retreat. The youth participated in small group sessions, larger age level sessions and worship. They were also able to help pack some health kits that will be sent to Haiti.

We would like to take this time to thank Jim Hedrick Sr. for volunteering his time to drive the Lakeside bus to Eagle Eyrie for us that weekend. Driving a bunch of teenagers three hours away is no easy task and we appreciate it! Thanks Jim.

The youth are also working on collecting money for this year's 30 Hour Famine. The Famine is sponsored by World Vision and it is an overnight event geared towards giving the youth a taste of what children in third world countries have to go through. 26,000 children die every day from hunger, but it only takes \$1 a day to keep one child fed. The youth will be out and about before and after church over the next few weeks asking for your donations. The event will be held jointly with Duncan Memorial UMC in Ashland, VA. The event begins after the youth eat lunch at school on Friday, March 5th. They are asked to fast from lunchtime Friday until Saturday evening in order to feel what it's like to be hungry. They will also participate in several service projects on Saturday, March 6th, all while fasting, and then conclude with a breaking the fast meal Saturday Evening.

We would like to take this time to ask for your help. The youth meet every Sunday night from 5:30-8:00. From 5:30-6:00, we offer the youth dinner. We need volunteers to help with this. It's easy! You would just need to be at the church by 5:15 (or earlier if use of kitchen is needed) to set up, serve your meal, and clean up the kitchen/space used. We would love to have families, Sunday School classes, groups that meet at the church or individuals to come share in fellowship with us. What you bring is up to you as long as it has an entrée, side dish and dessert. Drinks are provided by the youth group.
